

Off the Top of My Head

Each year June brings an annual event that is probably good medicine for me. I refer to the Annual Meeting of the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches. We are, in comparison to most denominations and associations, a small group. There is however a

wonderful intimacy as we gather once a year. It isn't just friendships, although there are many that go back more than thirty years. There is present, a Spirit, that manifests itself in care and mutual support.

While we meet, there are plenty of lectures and seminars - ranging from outreach we do as an



association to insurance and church stewardship. There are meals to be shared and many coffee breaks to learn new paths of ministry from one another. We share and together celebrate our successes and discuss solutions to our challenges. We also talk a lot about Congregationalism - about what makes us different.

It's a good thing to be reminded what it means to be a Congregationalist. I wish more of you could share in this meeting and be reminded as I am, that our belief is in the priesthood of all believers. We are ministers to each other. A Congregational church is the people's church. It belongs

to them. It is their work, their life, their responsibility. The people in congregational churches are the ones who must have visions, who must seek the Spirit's guidance, and who must lead the way. I find it inspiring each year at these annual meetings to be surrounded by lay people who are on fire with God's Spirit leading their congregations in new and exciting paths of ministry.

There is one more element that I have begun to treasure more than all the rest, and that is our worship together as an association. It is always fun to begin each day singing great songs of faith and praying together with five or six hundred other people of faith. It is a time we truly feel Christ in our midst. And that is, after all is said and done, what we are after in our national association and our local church.

Arthur Rouner, in his book *The Congregational Way* of Life, expresses it this way- "If Christ is truly in our midst then we will not be exhausting our energies in food sales and bazaars, socials and suppers—good enough in their places, but with too great priority in most of our churches. We will be looking for the great events of faith in our midst. We will sense a leading of the Spirit. People will come into our churches and know immediately in their hearts: 'Something is here. These people have something – a quality, a power, a passion, and a depth!" Rouner wrote that almost fifty years ago, but it seems to me our goal remains the same ...

A Note From Pastor Barry

Some days after Easter, Jesus ascended into heaven. This event is the last of the physical appearances to the apostles after Jesus' resurrection. Just before the ascension Jesus appeared to the eleven themselves as they were sitting

at the table. That was good for them; but what was not good for those in that room is that Jesus "... upbraided them for their lack of faith and stubbornness, [Why?] because they had not believed those who saw him after he had risen." Jesus was upset and he scolded his followers when they did not believe those who had experienced his resurrection! I can't imagine how those in that room felt.

Then Jesus instructed them to "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation." This becomes our life work also – and we do it best by giving a good example



by how we live. Just as our children and teen-agers watch us carefully to see how we act - what we do, not what we say - others around us do the same. Mark's Gospel then continues by telling us that after Jesus rebuked and then

directed them, he "... was taken up into heaven ..." What did they do then? "They went out and proclaimed the good news everywhere ..."

May we not be rebuked by the Lord. May we, instead, be filled with the dynamism of the Holy Spirit sent to us by Jesus so we, individually and as a energetic congregation, continue the vibrant ministries which our church does in God's name – for then we are going into all of the world – and others are watching.

With Children, Youth & Education Sunday fast approaching on June 2nd, the Board of Benevolence, Stewardship and Church Relations would like to take a moment to highlight the First Congregational Church College Scholarship for you,

In 2016, thanks to the generous giving of our church, the Board chose to make a trusting commitment to support our college-bound high school seniors through the Education Sunday Special Offering . The college scholarships (\$250 each annually) are open to three graduating high school seniors and are renewable for up to 4 years. The First Church college scholarship is rewarded to students who have participated in First Church programs, supported the church as volunteers, and who serve as role models for our younger children. A portion of the Education Sunday Special Offering is used to fund this scholarship, while the remainder is applied to support the ongoing education of Seminary students.

The recipients have been heavily involved in a multitude of volunteer and First Church programs including: Wisconsin Congregational Association Camp, Vacation Bible School, Youth Mission Trip, and volunteering at St. Vincent's as well as being active as ushers, acolytes and in the annual PF Christmas Play. Their service to First Church and their impressive applications and letters of recommendation show them to be exemplary youth with a bright future as citizens and Christians.

In May, new applicants were interviewed, and this year's recipients will be announced during Education Sunday on June 2nd. Please make a note to be in attendance at the 10 a.m. worship service to show your support for the youth and young adults who will be the future of First Church. FCC Capital Campaign: Elevate To The Next Level

Good things are happening at First Congregational Church. You can feel the energy and excitement as we look toward keeping our church sustainable for another 175 years. As we begin to look toward the future of First Congregational Church, your Board of Trustees has identified two significant facility projects in need of funding: An expanded and new elevator and a remodeled Chancel. The Congregation approved that the Trustees move forward with the planning and fund-raising efforts to make those projects a reality.

We started with the following assumptions:

- Project cost of approximately \$700,000 for both the elevator and Nave + 10% contingency margin for unexpected expenses, for a \$770,000 total cost
- A 3-year timeline to raise funds
- Number of pledging members and families: 180
- FCC Church funds contribution of \$385,000

This leaves approximately \$385,000 for the church to raise over the next three years. Recognizing that each pledging member and family will need to prayerfully consider what they can contribute for this effort, in addition to their annual pledges, the Board of Trustees has developed the following graduated contribution categories for your consideration.
