The late Senator John McCain spent five and a half years as prisoner of war in Vietnam in the 1960s. During that time, he was frequently tortured or held in solitary confinement. 

A Note From Pastor Barry

The Christmas season is a marvelous, amazing time, especially as we reflect on the story of Jesus' birth. Every birth is a miracle. Holding a newborn baby brings astonishing happiness. Picture the awesome joy of Mary and Joseph when Jesus was born. While we celebrate Christmas with familiar carols and Handel's Messiah, Jesus was most likely born in the silent stillness of a place made comfortable by the warmth of animals. So, whether at the time of the Nativity, or this year, the Christmas season offers us an opportunity to pause and consider that God is continuously wanting to make Himself known. While the birth of Christ was a one-time



divine event in history, the voice of God is always with us in the seemingly mundane: in the wonder of the color of leaves, water dancing in sunlight, the curiosity of children and adults.

Christmas carols, Handel's Messiah, holiday cards, and even catalogue shopping may bring us the feeling that the season has arrived. Yet our spirituality may deepen as we realize the hope God offers us through the coming of his Son into the world. For thousands of years people have yearned for His Light to brighten their hearts – now He is here! This is the joy and wonder of Christmas.

When Jesus was born Mary and Joseph's hearts were filled with hope. They had a precious child. They were in a safe place - at least temporarily, for soon enough Herod would learn of a possible threat to his power. But for a while, in their cozy micro-world, in the snug stable, with the heat of the animals, the world was good. It was full of anticipation, full of love. The radical, fateful, heaven-and-earth shaking events would occur later. Now was the time for reverence.

We often look for God in the big things of life, the big problems, the big matters. Yet in God's world we should also be alert to His voice in the small and common things of life. In the trivial we will appreciate God's presence continuously surrounding us. Even as we say a brief "Thank you" for our meal prayer we acknowledge His being. Dietrich Bonhoeffer lived appreciating God-with-us when he observed that "God is the beyond in the midst of life, not simply where human powers give out at the borders, but in the center of human achievement and joyous living."

Christmas opens our eyes to the astonishing wonder that God keeps coming to us: in creation, a long time ago through Abraham and Isaiah, and now, believe it or not, through the people around us. While we might persist to search for God in critical events; we should also pursue Him in the little, the everyday. Edmund A. Steimle made a wonderful observation when he said that God appears both to be less than he really is, and also larger than we can imagine, ". . . so we can recognize him in his love, in the big, overbearing problems of a world in radical change, or in the simple delights of daily life. He's literally all over the place hoping that we'll have the eyes to see and the ears to listen to his coming."

May this Christmas season be blessed for you!

During COVID-19, Brett has kept himself busy by biking, including 40-mile rides through the summer. He also started playing the recorder in March to give himself something to do when all his regular activities were getting cancelled, and. "hasn't looked back since." He now has 8 recorders and, being a big early music fan, loves to play Renaissance and Baroque music. Once it's safe to play wind instruments in a group, he hopes to join or form an ensemble.

A Report to the Congregation

These are trying times with significant disruption in the life of First Church over the last nine months. We continue to have faith that each of you is doing what is necessary to stay safe. We also have faith that there will be a brighter future for all of us.

The elevator team would like to bring you up to date on the elevator project.

The project is actively proceeding. The team reviewed the original construction drawings to understand the underlying assumptions and risks. The project was initially based on installing a new hydraulic elevator. It would require a 5-foot pit that we determined would jeopardize the building's foundations and expose the construction zone to risks of increased excavation collapse. This high-risk roadblock led to searching for ways to mitigate these risks.

We looked at alternate locations for the elevator. The current location remained as the best choice. Trying to find a way to reduce the foundation risks led us to review the original elevator choices. An electric elevator, originally rejected, showed promise for us. While the size of the car remains the same, the external shaft is smaller and only requires a 4-foot pit. The dimensions of the electric elevator and the smaller pit would reduce the structural issues and minimize the intrusion into areas outside the shaft. As the State code requires a 5-foot pit, we would need a State code variance for the project to proceed.

In parallel, after a short delay in February and March, multiple experts were brought in individually to look over the proposed construction zone and offer opinions to understand and reduce risks to the facility.

We have applied for the code variance and the City of Wauwatosa has approved it. It has been forwarded to the state elevator safety office for their approval. We have received positive feedback that the variance approval is pretty normal for older buildings. Due to a State scheduling mistake, the review meeting has been delayed to January 5th. Approval will set the project in motion.

Upon approval, the construction drawings will be updated to show the revised construction needs and details. With these drawings, we will make formal requests for final bids and choose a general contractor. Construction schedules will be formalized and the impact on church activities will be assessed.

We are in pretty good shape financially as the commitments for the Capital Campaign from members were above expectations. We are thankful for your support as many have already fulfilled their commitments. We ask for your continued and timely donations as you are able. Funds from the Capital Campaign, supplemented by Church funds, should enable us to move forward with the project in 2021.
