New Life Abounds

As I write this, the “April showers that bring May flowers” have been intense storms, tornado sirens, and flooding ... and yet we also are seeing the greening and flowering of growth as well. I found myself relating the emergence of spring to Holy Week—an intense, experiential time we had together that now draws us into the greening and flowering of new life. If we continue reading through the gospel following the resurrection, we read of people encountering the risen Christ, new life right in front of them in fleshy, tangible ways ... feeling His breath on them as he says, “Peace be with you.” Thomas is invited to touch Jesus’ wounds from the cross. Jesus’ hands hold and break bread, cooking breakfast on the shore for disciples who have gone back to fishing for fish. Impossibly present and real. New life right in front of them. Don’t you imagine those followers, with each encounter, asking themselves, “What’s next? Where does our story go from here?”

Truth is, we are always in the midst of new life: gardens flowering or beginning to be planted, shifting world news and uncertainty, relationships changing, possibilities always around us. Even as the storms of mid-April passed, we looked ahead, remembering and hoping for the beauty of Spring flowering into summer in Wisconsin. Which again, makes me think of how, each year, we have this cadence of remembering and hoping for that movement, from storms to new life, and how we need to live this together.

I know it is May, but let us say again, “Christ is Risen!” and eagerly step into “so, what’s next?” to see where our story will go from here. Let us remember those early encounters some had with the risen Christ and seek to see and feel God’s presence in other people’s wounds, in the way we break bread and offer it where needed. I feel that spirit of life here among you and am hopeful for the variety of ways God is a living and tangible presence among us, and beyond us ... breathing new life.

As always, there is more for you to take in throughout this Columns. I am looking forward to May 3rd, which will combine an enhanced coffee hour with quiches and home-baked cookies, youth sharing their talents, and a few items to bid on to help fund our Mission Team. May 17th, an amazing group of youth will confirm their understanding of faith, along with a variety of people who will become members of First Church, joining us as we follow our covenant. May 31st is Celebration Sunday, through which we praise God while appreciating the gifts of the First Church music ministry.

We also breathe new life in May as a subcommittee of the Board of Christian Education reviews a new curriculum, and as we reach out for an Associate Minister. The Search and Call Committee (Ann Harris, JC Moore, John Griffith, Elizabeth Carger, Kristin Stern, Caitlyn O’Meara, and me) has begun to send out communications inviting applicants to apply for the Associate Minister position. Taking Root

I love plants. When I first began as an intern last May, I cut a sprig from one of my houseplants and put it in a cup of water in the windowsill at my office at the church. In the past I have had great luck with this—have enjoyed watching the process of a cut stem forming roots within the water, stretching out into dozens of tender white roots until it nearly fills the bottom of the glass, and then transplanting it into soil and watching a plant emerge from just that one shoot. Only, this time, the roots never took. I tried again. Making sure I sterilized the scissors first, I cut the sprig, getting it at a nice angle, used fresh water, moved it from sunlight to shade and back again, and still to no avail. Then a church member gave me a nice potted plant taken from a shoot of his own. The plant did well in the window behind my desk for many months, but then, over Christmas, I went away for a few weeks to explore what life might have in store for me. When I returned, that plant had withered and, sadly, was beyond revival.

Why don't roots take sometimes? How is it that being surrounded by the love and community and the support God puts into our paths seems like an obstacle? Doesn't He know I had plans of my own?

Last fall, Rev. Julie said she foresaw that God had something different in mind for me during this season of my life than what I had cast as my own vision. She regularly cautions me that I have the tendency to think too small, and she is right. Comfort and security are nice. Being in a community that is full of love and support is surely much easier than embarking on an unknown journey with merely sandals and a new wife... lambs among wolves.

I have spent the better part of a year meditating on the passage from Luke 10 that many of you are experiencing alongside Rev. Julie in your board meetings. We were told, when we started this Lectio Divina process, that you will have completed the passage and are ready to explore another when you are no longer reading the passage... the passage is reading you. One could also say, the power of the Word begins to show up in our actions and what we do. This passage has been a powerful transformative process for me, as I now depart for a season to spread the message of Peace to those who will hear. Knowing I have the love and continued support as an ordained Congregational minister from this beautiful community will definitely bolster my efforts on the days when that peace is rejected. I hope you all will share with me the joys on the days when our message of peace is accepted!

I will cut a fresh sprig when I land in Northern Virginia and keep you all abreast of how it is doing and whether roots appear. With much love and gratitude... Rev. Chip

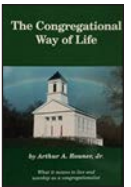

We'll remind you as we get closer to June 14th.

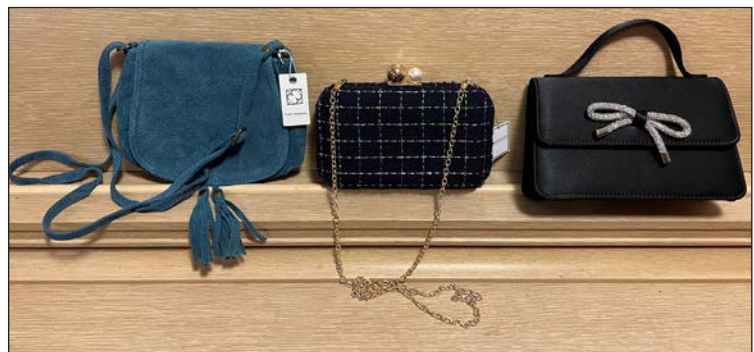

Stewardship and Benevolence in Action by Tori Raddemann, Chair

The Board of Stewardship and Benevolence has been actively carrying out our church's Covenant. Thanks to the faithful giving of this congregation, the Board has so far distribute \$13,000 in benevolence funds in 2026 to support meaningful work locally and globally.

In addition, our Easter Special Offering resulted in a generous gift of \$8300, which was shared equally between the Tosa Community Food Pantry and the Congregational Church of Myanmar, extending care to neighbors near and far.

The Board is also supporting an Intergenerational Mission Project, connected with the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches Annual Meeting & Conference, by using benevolence funds to purchase requested items that will be used to fill hundreds of "ditty bags" for the Seafarers' Friend mission. These bags provide practical supplies and encouragement to seafarers who spend long periods of time away from home.

Throughout the year, you will continue to hear directly from some of the organizations we support during "Benevolence Minutes" on select Sunday mornings—similar to what we recently heard from Cindy Davis about Milwaukee Treatment Courts. These "Benevolence Minutes" help our congregation better understand where benevolence dollars are going and the important work these organizations are doing with your support.

Looking ahead, please join us for Children & Youth Sunday on June 7th. On this day, senior scholarship recipients will be announced, and a special offering will be taken to support our Scholarship Fund. Each year, we support 13–15 students for up to four years, and our goal is to raise \$3,900 to continue investing in their educational/military journeys.

Thank you for your continued generosity and support of the work of Stewardship and Benevolence. Together, we are making a meaningful impact — both near and far.
